"Then Jesus told his disciples, 'If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his soul? Or what shall a man give in return for his soul? For the Son of Man is going to come with his angels in the glory of his Father, and then he will repay each person according to what he has done."

- Matthew 16:24-27 (ESV)

Although the Oxford University Press's "Word of the Year" announcements are by no means definitive or comprehensive assessments of the current cultural moment, I find them intriguing to consider as one way of making sense of where we are as a society. Looking at their selections over the past decade, for example, we find some interesting trends in the words chosen for this esteemed distinction:

2013: selfie 2014: vape

2011. Vap

2015: 😂

2016: post-truth 2017: youthquake

2018: toxic

2019: climate emergency

2020: (no single word chosen; COVID-19 and pandemic selected, among others)

2021: vax

2022: goblin mode

2023: rizz

2024: brain rot

Sure, the years 2019-2021 encapsulate a particular focus on world events and phenomena, whether related to the environment or public health, but I am especially struck by the self-focused nature of the other selections. Selfies provide us with the opportunity to capture ourselves, particularly our physical appearance, and convey an image to others in the manner of our choosing. The characterization that we live in a post-truth society suggests that objective facts and evidence are less influential in shaping public opinion than emotions and personal beliefs. In such a world, "the truth" becomes frighteningly eclipsed by "my truth" with subsequent concerns about relativism and even nihilism soon to follow.

Without commenting on the potentially solipsistic nuances and connotations for each of the aforementioned Words of the Year, it also seems worth noting their emphasis on self-serving behavior. Though the publisher's own Oxford English Dictionary may not define goblin mode or rizz, the Urban Dictionary and Wikipedia—two stalwarts of academic research—explain those terms as follows:

goblin mode: a type of behavior that is unapologetically self-indulgent, lazy, or greedy, typically in a way that rejects social norms or expectations

rizz: a person's ability to seduce a potential (usually female) love interest; charm or "game."

Yikes. Whether casually hedonistic or patently disrespectful, these words bespeak a toxic cultural landscape. The most recent addition to the list, the selection for 2024, is likewise indicative of some potentially concerning cultural trends and individual behaviors observed in society today, which likely impact all of us to some extent in our current Internet Age:



brain rot: the supposed deterioration of a person's mental or intellectual state, especially viewed as a result of overconsumption of trivial material, especially online

To be fair, the Oxford University Press does not aim to make moral claims or evaluations about the words it annually acknowledges. Rather, they nominate potential Words of the Year by using software to collect and scan approximately 150 million English words in use online, and after compiling this data, a team of dictionary editors, lexicographers, and other staff members evaluate the offerings and determine the final selection based on the word's notability and relevance.

The truth of the matter is that while I do not see these words as necessarily driving our culture, I would like to posit that they reflect the increasingly self-centered nature of our society. As your time as a Hill Country student draws to a close, my hope and prayer is that your educational experience has primed you for a lifetime of discipleship and sacrifice as you pursue not only excellence in your academic and professional endeavors but seek to impact our world by sharing the life-changing reality and love of Jesus Christ. While the prevailing worldly sentiment may be that it is perfectly acceptable to wallow in narcissism, hedonism, or other self-serving ideologies, Jesus calls us to a better way forward, and we are collectively blessed to invite others on that journey as well.

In chapter 16 of Matthew's gospel, Jesus foretells his death and resurrection to the disciples, though Peter bristles at the idea, and his followers struggle to comprehend the kind of sacrifice he intends to make on their—and the world's—behalf. Furthermore, Jesus declares the following: "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his soul?" Though we may not literally take up a Roman cross in the manner that Christ did, he also calls us to give up our lives, perhaps sacrificing certain kinds of worldly success or personal preferences in exchange for something far greater. As you approach your graduation—an incredible milestone in your life as a young adult—you likely find yourself at a point when success in college, in your career, and in other areas of life seem like the utmost priorities. These are not bad things in and of themselves, but my encouragement and challenge to you are that as you embark on the next chapter of your respective journeys, you do not lose sight of the formative years you had with your families, churches, and Hill Country, all of which have hopefully prepared you to pursue excellence in ways that advance the gospel and share God's love with others, refusing to "forfeit your soul" in the process.


ELIZABETH HOPE HUANG | Salutatorian


